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
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
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

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Attorney General Kamala D. Harris Unveils Bureau of Children's Justice

Attorney General Kamala D. Harris unveiled the Bureau of Children's Justice within the California Department of Justice that will work to ensure all of California's children are on track to meet their full potential. In the Bureau's first action, Attorney General Harris sent a letter to officials in all 58 counties in California, outlining their legal responsibilities with regard to foster youth and urging each county to evaluate their current enforcement and oversight policies and practices.

The Bureau will enforce criminal and civil laws to hold those who prey on children accountable; work with a range of local, state, and national stakeholders to increase support for vulnerable children to prevent bad outcomes; and identify and pursue improvements to policies impacting children.

"We simply cannot let down our most vulnerable children today, then lock them up tomorrow and act surprised," said Attorney General Harris. "The Bureau of Children's Justice will continue our smart on crime approach by addressing the root causes of crime, including our broken foster care system, and making certain that California's children receive full protection under the law and equal opportunities to succeed. One of the Bureau's first orders of business will be to look at enforcement gaps in the foster care system and ensure that government agencies are held accountable to those entrusted in their care."

Attorney General Harris' letter to counties lays out their responsibilities in protecting children in foster care and overseeing the agencies that provide direct services to these children. In the coming months, the Bureau will focus on identifying accountability and enforcement gaps in the foster system to ensure children have the support they need.

"We are thrilled that Attorney General Harris is making children her top priority with this new Bureau," said Ted Lempert, president of Children Now. "Given the Attorney General's past leadership and success with reducing chronic absence and suspensions in California, I'm confident the new Bureau will be very positive for children."

"I'm happy to join Attorney General Harris in shining a spotlight on the importance of safeguarding our children," said Diana S. Dooley, Secretary of the California Health and Human Services Agency. "We at the California Health and Human Services Agency place a high interest and priority on addressing childhood trauma and we are committed with our county and community partners to meet the needs of all of our kids."

The Bureau will draw on the civil and criminal law enforcement capacity of the California Department of Justice and build on CADOJ's existing work on key issues affecting children. Core priorities for the newly formed bureau include California's foster care, adoption, and juvenile justice systems, Discrimination and inequities in education, California's elementary school truancy crisis, Human trafficking of vulnerable youth, Childhood trauma and exposure to violence

Attorney General Harris also announced that the California Department of Justice was one of just three state agencies accepted by the U.S. Department of Justice to be part of its national Defending Childhood Initiative. Through this initiative, California will work to improve outcomes for children exposed to trauma by ensuring that at-risk children are screened for exposure to violence at school, when they visit a pediatrician, or when they become involved with child welfare and juvenile justice systems.

"I commend Attorney General Harris for taking this important step to protect the youngest and most vulnerable Californians," said Dr. Robert K. Ross, President and CEO, The California Endowment. "The Bureau of Children's Justice will watch over our state's legal system and guarantee greater protection for our children, safeguarding their physical, social and emotional health and helping to ensure that everyone has the opportunity to grow up healthy and safe."

The Bureau will expand CADOJ's efforts to combat the crisis of elementary school truancy, piloting programs with school districts to improve attendance and launching a new partnership with University of California, Santa Barbara to ensure these pilots can be replicated across the

The Bureau draws on Attorney General Harris' expertise as a career prosecutor focusing on sexual and physical crimes against children and her commitment to defending every child in California. Attorney General Harris served two terms as District Attorney of San Francisco, where she created a child sexual assault unit. She also led the San Francisco City Attorney's Division on Children and Families and specialized in prosecuting child sexual assault cases at the Alameda County District Attorney's Office.

The Bureau will be staffed by attorneys and experts on legal issues impacting children, including civil rights, education, consumer protection, nonprofit charities, child welfare, privacy and identity theft, fraud, and human trafficking.

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Janet Turner Print Museum to Present "Animals: Fun, Fantastic, Fierce" March 9 – April 11



The Janet Turner Print Museum at CSU, Chico opens its new exhibition, "Animals: Fun, Fantastic, Fierce," on March 9 with prints selected from the Turner Print Collection illustrating the variety of works that include animals as subjects. A curator's talk will be held on Thursday, March 12 in Rowland-Taylor Recital Hall, PAC 134, with a reception to follow at The Turner Museum, Meriam Library. The exhibit will be open to the public through April 11.

The late Janet Turner was known for her work featuring local birds and their environment. Animals are a popular theme among printmakers and this exhibition presents a sampling of the possibilities exploring this subject and was curated to distinguish and highlight the great variety of interpretations. Local artists who are featured in the exhibit include the late Paul Feldhaus and former Turner students Sue Richardson and Darrel Carpenter.

"This exhibition not only supports a historical view of a particular subject, but also has a cultural context that demonstrates that animal imagery serves a variety of purposes from entertainment to spiritual connection," said Catherine Sul-



livan, Curator of The Turner Print Museum.

This exhibition also marks the beginning of the Turner Print Museum's Jr. Curator Program. Two 6th grade students were selected by Sullivan and had the opportunity to assist in the final exhibition selection and participate in the design layout for the auxiliary Turner space, the cases in Ayres Hall. In addition, under the direction of Graduate Curatorial Intern Sara Smallhouse, they learned formal art analysis for the production of their written text label for a print they selected from the Museum gallery portion of the exhibition.

"Anyone who enjoys and relates to animals will find something they like and maybe some-

thing unexpected," added Sullivan.

The Turner Print Museum is located in Meriam Library on the CSU, Chico campus, adjacent to the Valene L. Smith Museum of Anthropology. Viewing hours are 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday-Saturday during scheduled exhibitions. Parking is available on nearby Chico streets and also at adjacent Chico State parking lots.

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Recommendation: Protect Against Measles before International Travel

With the spring holidays approaching in the next weeks, many Californians are heading to the Philippines or other countries where measles outbreaks are occurring or measles circulates in the population. The California Department of Public Health (CDPH) strongly encourages all Californians to make sure they are protected against measles and other dangerous diseases before they go abroad.

"Measles is extremely contagious and can be very serious. The best way to protect yourself and your family against measles is with the Measles Mumps and Rubella (MMR) vaccination, which is 97 percent effective after two doses," says Dr. Gil Chavez, deputy director of the CDPH Center for Infectious Diseases and state epidemiologist. "Vaccination is especially important for those who plan to travel internationally, which places them at high risk of getting the disease and spreading it to others after they come home."

The current outbreak beginning in December 2014 is likely to have started from a traveler who got measles overseas. Most cases of measles in the United States in 2014 were associated with travel to and from the Philippines, where measles has been widespread. Other cases were associated with travel elsewhere in Asia, Europe or Africa. Measles has also been spread at international airports.

Immunization with MMR vaccine pro-

tects against measles while abroad and back at home. Unvaccinated Californians who are traveling outside of North or South America should receive the MMR vaccine before they go. Infants who are traveling abroad can be vaccinated with an early dose as young as six months of age (though they should also have the two standard doses of the MMR at 12-15 months and at 4-6 years of age).

Check with your health care provider to see whether you and your family are fully protected against measles, influenza and other diseases that are common in other countries. Travelers can find helpful information about the vaccinations needed on the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) website.

Travelers should also watch for the symptoms of measles after returning home. Measles begins with a fever that lasts for a couple of days, followed by a cough, runny nose, red, watery eyes, and rash. The rash typically appears first on the face, along the hairline, and behind the ears and then affects the rest of the body. If you think you or a family member may have measles, promptly contact your health care provider by telephone before entering a medical facility, where the disease could spread to others.

Help Endangered Species With Your Tax Return

Would you like to help protect California's rare, threatened and endangered species? The California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) invites you to do that by making a voluntary contribution to the Rare and Endangered Species Protection Program and/or the California Sea Otter Fund on your California income tax return. Just enter the dollar amount you wish to donate on lines 403 and/or 410 of your tax return (form 540). If you itemize deductions, you can deduct the amount you donate on next year's return.

"Donations to these funds have helped CDFW study species that are in trouble, determine what they need to thrive and develop ways to improve their health and

populations," said CDFW Director Charlton H. Bonham. "Californians continue to show they understand and care about threatened and endangered species, and the need to protect their habitat."

One of CDFW's tax donation funds facilitates re-

covery of the southern sea otter, which is listed as threatened under the federal Endangered Species Act and as a Fully Protected Species under state law. A 2014 survev indicated there are fewer than 3.000 sea otters in California waters - a fraction of their historic numbers. This small population is vulnerable to oil spills, environmental pollution, predation by white sharks and other threats.

Donations to the California Sea Otter Fund support research by CDFW scientists, who are currently studying 15 years of sea otter mortality information and recently discovered viruses not previously known in sea otters. These studies should provide a better understanding of mortality causes and contribute to population recovery efforts.

Donations to the Rare and Endangered Species Protection Program support numerous conservation projects for California's rare, threatened and endangered species, including:

Santa Cruz long-toed salamander:



Known to exist in only a few locations in Santa Cruz and Monterey counties. CDFW works with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and the Santa Cruz County Resource Conservation District to create and enhance habitat for this species on preserves that have been set aside for its conserva-

Island fox: Small foxes that live on the Channel Islands off of Southern California. CDFW has worked with public and private partners to increase the number of foxes on all of the islands from a few hundred to more than 5,800 foxes.

Yellow-billed cuckoo: Rare and secretive birds that have declined markedly with the destruction of riparian habitat in Cali-

> fornia. CDFW is working with multiple partners to survey and monitor them and to implement recovery actions.

> Giant garter snake: A highly aquatic snake whose marsh habitat in the Central Valley has likely been further reduced in

some areas by drought. CDFW has been working with the multiple partners to ensure water is delivered to important areas for the species' survival.


California tiger salamander: The vernal pools that this species typically breeds in have also likely been impacted by the drought in some areas. CDFW is working with multiple partners to coordinate studies of these colorful salamanders and to protect their habitat.

CDFW biologists have been able to achieve important recovery milestones to conserve vulnerable species, thanks to California taxpayers like you. If someone else prepares your state tax return, please let him or her know you want to donate to the California Sea Otter Fund on line 410 or the Rare and Endangered Species Protection Program on line 403. If you use Turbo Tax, when you're near the end of your tax return it should ask if you want to make a voluntary contribution to a special fund. Click "Yes" and go to lines 403 and 410.

The state has listed more than 200 species of plants and 80 species of animals as rare, threatened or endangered. Money raised through the tax donation program helps pay for essential CDFW research and recovery efforts for these plants and animals, and critical efforts to restore and conserve their habitat

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



California State Parks' **Transformation Team Releases Action Plan, Launches New Website**

The California State Parks' Transformation Team today launched a public website and released their first Transformation Action Plan, which outlines Strategic Goals as well as thirty different priority initiatives for State Parks. The Transformation Action Plan closely follows the Parks Forward final report's four basic themes, such as making fundamental changes to the Department, enhancing partnerships, expanding park access, and garnering stable and diversified funding.

"Our Transformation Team is giving us a tremendous window of opportunity to develop and plan strategies that will result in meaningful and positive changes throughout the system," said Lisa Mangat, Acting Director, California State Parks. "Their work is critical for the future of State Parks, and will be a process that is open and accountable. I invite the public to join us in this positive transformation."

The Transformation Team is composed of experienced parks staff and outside consultants, and is tasked with developing and leading State Parks in executing structural and sustainable reforms to strengthen the State Parks System. The Team was formed to begin implementation and execution of the Parks Forward initiatives. Currently, there are fifteen (15) members in the Transformation Team. They are divided into eight different committees that will be in charge of implementing the strategic goals and initiatives. Additional members will be added from internal and external resources as the process evolves.

"The members of the Transformation Team bring with them a wide variety of expertise and backgrounds, and they are all strongly committed to this historic effort," said Steve Szalay, Transformation Team Leader and Special Advisor to the Secretary for the Natural Resources Agency. "The Transformation Action Plan will be our guiding document to set up a framework that will allow us to be dynamic and flexible, and will be modified as these initiatives move from the planning stage into actual deliverables."

Over the next two years, the Transformation Team will work on a series of initiatives supporting specific goals that will result in changed policies, procedures, guidelines, and organizational structures that support an entrepreneurial, service-oriented, creative and collaborative culture within State Parks.


The Transformation Team Action Plan will be updated regularly. That information will be posted on the Transformation Team website, along with priorities and initiatives.


