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


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Impressions of Dubai, Part 3

Nationalities. Dubai is a city of people from everywhere in the world, whether they live and work there, or are simply visiting. We met people from Romania, Sweden, India, Vietnam, Syria, Philippines, Australia, South Africa, etc. The Syrian, a young woman we met on the metro, told us she had a one-month visitor's visa, and had to find a job within that time period or she would have to go back to Syria. We asked if her family had come with her; she replied no, and said they were suffering with all the turmoil currently raging in Syria. She is a pharmacist and is qualified in Syria and Dubai to practice her profession. We suggested she try the United States, but she said she would not be qualified without more schooling. Ironically, she has a brother living in Sacramento, whom she has visited. What a small world!

We were pleasantly surprised at the politeness of almost everyone we met. For such a large city (population 1.8 million), people of all ages were very quiet, polite, and well-behaved. There was no graffiti anywhere, very little litter, and we were told women could feel safe walking around the city at 2:00 a.m. We believe this is because of a high degree of social order, and the knowledge of swift and sure justice should a crime be committed or laws broken.

Age Demographics. We were told that people who immigrate to Dubai must leave when they are 50, unless they own an apartment or a business. Thus, we did not see a lot of older folks in our daily travels, and sometimes we were the oldest people in the metro car. Four times out of five, other people on the metro would offer us their seats, and that is how we met so many nice people and struck up such interesting conversations. Almost everyone speaks English. Almost all signs are in English and Arabic,

and this includes the green neon sign on the public library!

Architecture. David and I are devotees of historic architecture, and there are not many old buildings in Dubai. One we did see was the Sheik Saeed Al Maktoum House, built in 1894 by the grandfather of the present ruler. The house features a central courtyard and windtowers for cooling the house before electricity. New house design in Dubai and Abu Dhabi often feature decorative windtowers as an architectural statement.

The oldest building in Dubai, Al Fahidi Fort, was built in 1799 to protect against foreign invaders, and is now the Dubai Museum. It features examples of old fishing and pearling ships, as well as a stunning re-creation of the waterfront, markets, and daily life and culture of old Dubai. Though small, it is one of the best history museums we have ever visited.

Dubai's new buildings are amazing in their design. The most famous, of course, is the Burj Khalifa, the tallest building in the world. We went to the top (technically the 124th floor), which had a 360o view of the city. The second most famous building is the Burj al Arab, an ultra-luxurious, ultra-expensive hotel built in the shape of a dhow boat's sail. Built on an artificial island, and reached by a private drive, the Burj al Arab has been called "...the only 7-star hotel" in the world.

Another famous building is the Atlantis, modeled after the Atlantis in the Bahamas. What makes this one unique is that it is built at the top of the first of the famous Palm Islands, the Palm Jumeirah. The Palm Jumeirah consists of infill in the shape of a palm tree, and is so large and distinct, it can be seen from the International Space Station. Lastly, close to the Burj al Arab is the Jumeirah Beach Hotel, designed in the shape of an ocean wave.






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Louis Here...
